

The Committee is seeking to appoint a new member. The task is not onerous and most of the business is conducted by email. The Committee is responsible for the oversight of the bequest and is supported by our own local administrator and a finance officer from 121.

Applications are received from the beneficiary congregations, i.e. those charges located wholly or partially within Cowal, and these are reviewed by members of the committee via email to determine if these are appropriate. We also meet annually, typically online but can be in-person, to review the past year's work and to determine a budget for the following year. This meeting usually takes place in September as the financial year starts on the 1st January. Expenses associated with the conduct of business are provided.



Bindal News - Mr Douglas Gordon

The countryside looks lovely, when the Oil Seed Rape (OSR) comes into flower. The bright yellow of OSR and green of spring barley creates a patchwork of colours. Then you have the bare ground of newly planted potatoes. The bumble bees and bees love the OSR, as there are so many flowers with pollen to choose from. It makes a white honey, once extracted from the honeycomb that needs to be stirred slowly in a pan, if it is stirred too fast, it will set rock hard.

I was bad with asthma & hay fever when I was young. But I can walk into a field of OSR, and it doesn't affect me. As the pollen is that heavy, it either sticks to your clothes or falls to the ground when you brush against the flowers. The pollen will not blow in the wind like pollen from grass, barley etc, which are in flower at the same time. I know of some people who say are affected by the smell of it and brightness of the flowers.

We humans need the sun to brighten our day and warm us up, as it gives us Vitamin D. But too much can cause other problems. We live in a beautiful part of the world, which changes as the seasons change. OSR produces seeds in pods which when crushed can produce oil for cooking and making margarine and bio diesel. But we also need the oil that comes out of the ground. We need oil to lubricate our windmills and tractor engines, hydraulics, fuel, nitrogen fertiliser and sprays. But we also need oil for our medicines and creams which we use for ourselves. It is a fact of life and far better when we have our own instead of importing it from abroad, just like

our food where we control it. It also helps the country's balance of payments with other countries. The Bible tells us about Jesus, who is the author of life. He was in the beginning before the world was formed. In Revelation 22 v16, Jesus identifies himself as "the bright morning star". We need to look to Jesus to brighten our lives up and put our trust in Jesus and say we are sorry for our sins (which is guilt or wrongdoing). John 3 v 16. For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. Yes, the devil (Satan) does not want us to be happy in Jesus. He hardens people's minds against God. Puts all sort of ideas in our head that will make us happy, some people experiment with drink & drugs. The devil will create lots of problems like depression. We need to pray (Talk) to Jesus and ask him to help us through

our lives by lubricating our minds with what we read in the Bible. We need to slow down & take time to read the Bible and talk (pray) to Jesus everyday about our problems and ask him for help with our lives.

We live in a fast-moving world, where we can get instant answers on the Internet through search browsers like Google with answers to all our questions, some are false and lead us astray. But we need to take time & look around us at the beauty of the countryside, all the different colours, shapes of trees and hills that we can see. The wonder of God's creation is all around us to enjoy it. But so many people are rushing around today, they don't take time to recharge their lives to help us calm down. That is what I like about church, we have a time to

switch off from the world and sing praises to God and hear what the bible has to say about certain passages in the Bible. We listen to the preacher praying (talking) to God and we can make these our prayers too, when we go home and pray at home, and add our own prayers for family, friends and any problems that might arise.

CATHEDRAL LECTURES ON CONFLICT AND RECONCILIATION


